Using Hammers, Saws, Chisels, Measuring and Marking Devices, Power Drills, Saws, and Air Guns

Working on "Rough" Carpentry
Erecting Framework and Heavy Installation
Working on "Finish" Carpentry

Installing Molding, Door Frames, Paneling, Cabinets, and Stairs

Qualifying juniors can work with residential and commercial carpenters during the summer before their senior year. During their senior year, students can work with residential and commercial carpenters by alternating their work and school schedules.
